The Neighborhood Gardener

Now that summer is here, keep your kids busy outdoors with some educational gardening projects. Gardening can be fun for the whole family, and there are plenty of projects you can do with your kids that will instill a love for gardening and the outdoors. Kids love to get dirty, so create some opportunities for them to do that.

- Plant seeds. Children love watching the little plants grow into beautiful flowers and tasty vegetables.
- Invite butterflies to your garden. Butterfly gardens are always a big hit with kids. As you choose plants together, you can teach them about larval and nectar plants, and talk about the benefits of insects. Later you'll watch butterflies flock to the flowers. See Butterfly Gardening in Florida for more information.
- Build a birdfeeder or create a toad house. Kids like feeling handy and will get a kick out of watching for creatures that take advantage of their handiwork.
- Make a fort or hideout. They provide kids with the perfect place to play in the yard and create their own magical adventures.
- Build a vine teepee together for them to use as a fort.
- Scout for insects. Most kids love learning about creepy crawlies, so teaching those that are old enough to scout for insects can be a fun summer activity.
- Build a tree house (the right way). Tree houses are a
 lot of fun for kids, but built incorrectly, they aren't
 much fun for the tree. Driving nails and bolts into a tree
 can damage it, and tying chains or ropes around
 branches may eventually cut off growth. Instead, build
 an unattached, freestanding tree house from the
 ground up for a tree-friendly play area at leaf level.
 Ropes, ladders, and bridges can connect the tree house
 to the tree for maximum enjoyment of the tree's
 canopy.
- Organize a nature scavenger hunt. Use items such as pinecones, certain shaped leaves, certain colored flowers, etc.—whatever is available in your yard or nearby park.

READY FOR KINDERGARTEN?

If your child's preschool years are coming to an end, your thoughts are probably turning toward kindergarten. But is your child ready to move on to the "big" school? What skills do kindergarten teachers expect their new students to have? To help answer those questions (and ease your mind), we've asked highly regarded kindergarten teachers from around the country to share their insights on helping your child gain the right mix of kindergartenreadiness skills.

The skill sets they are looking for might surprise you. Because of the national focus on improving education and meeting standards, you might think that it's most important for children to enter kindergarten knowing their ABCs, numbers, shapes, and colors so they can keep up with the curriculum. While teachers would love children to come in with some letter and number recognition, they don't want you to drill your kids on academic skills. There are equally — if not more — important readiness skills that set the stage for your child's learning. Raising an eager learner is the goal, and it can be achieved easily through play and day-to-day activities. The top readiness skills that kindergarten teachers look for are:

- Enthusiasm Toward Learning
- Solid Oral-Language Skills
- The Ability to Listen
- The Desire to Be Independent
- The Ability to Play Well with Others
- Strong Fine-Motor Skills
- · Basic Letter and Number Recognition

"I look for those qualities that prime children to be successful in school," says Kim Hughes. Does the child approach learning enthusiastically? Is she eager to explore and discover? Does she ask questions, take initiative, and persist when tasks are difficult? "Parents can set aside a little time each day to investigate the world with their preschooler and answer those endless questions," says Sandra Waite-Stupiansky. As you drive or walk along in the park, point out your child's surroundings — the different trees or the various birds at the feeder. Demonstrate how things work. "You'll help your child develop beginning science skills — the ability to form a hypothesis, test it out, and come up with new questions and theories," Waite-Stupiansky explains. "The more kids notice, the more curious they'll become. And we'll be building on that curiosity in kindergarten." Most important, always keep the focus on fun. "Relax, and enjoy your children," Mosier says. "Read, play, and go places. And talk the whole time you're doing it!"
